Job's Daughters International is a Masonic affiliated youth organization for girls and young women aged 10 to 20. The organization is commonly referred to as simply Job's Daughters, and sometimes abbreviated as JDI. Job's Daughters welcomes many religions and cultures.



The International Order of the Rainbow for Girls is a Masonic youth service organization which teaches leadership training through community service. Young women learn about the value of charity and service through their work and involvement with their annual local and Grand service projects.



The Order of the Eastern Star is a Masonic appendant body open to both men and women. It was established in 1850 by lawyer and educator Rob Morris, a noted Freemason, but was only adopted and approved as an appendant body of the Masonic Fraternity in 1873.



The Order of the Amaranth is a Masonicaffiliated organization for Master Masons and their Ladies founded in 1873. As in the Order of the Eastern Star, members of the Order must be age 18 and older; men must be Master Masons; and women must be related to Masons as wives, mothers, daughters, widows, sisters, nieces, aunts, et cetera, or have been active members of the Rainbow or Job's Daughters for more than three years and be recommended by a Master Mason. (Note: As of 2017, women without masonic relationships may apply for membership with the sponsorship of two master masons in good standing.)

In the Order's teachings, the members are emphatically reminded of their duties to God, to their country and to their fellow beings. They are urged to portray, by precept and example, their belief in the "Golden Rule" and by conforming to the virtues inherent in TRUTH, FAITH, WISDOM and CHARITY they can prove to others the goodness promulgated by the Order. Amaranth is organized into Courts, under Grand Courts at the State level. The primary body is called the Supreme Council (which has some subordinate Courts directly under it, as well). Women

members of the Order are addressed as "Honored Lady", while men are referred to as "Sir Knight".

The order's primary philanthropic project is the Amaranth Diabetes Foundation.

When you visit the Lodge, look at the base of the new pole. That's where we will be placing the legacy bricks that are now being sold as an historical marker.

It's a grand old flag

A flag is a piece of cloth, but it is much more than that. It is defined as "a piece of cloth or bunting, often attached to a staff, with definite colors, patterns, or symbolic devices, used as a national or state symbol."


On June 14, 1777, less than a year after the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the Continental Congress adopted a design for a flag for the new nation known as the United States of America. The Continental Congress determined that "The flag of the United States shall be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white on a blue field, representing a new constellation."

As the nation grew and the number of states increased, the design changed by adding a star to represent each new state. So, the flag we know and appreciate has thirteen stripes representing the original thirteen states and fifty stars representing the fifty states in the Union.

In 1895, to recognize the anniversary of the adoption of the flag, the Congress of the United States, without making it a legal holiday, declared June 14 to be Flag Day.

June 14, in all probability, will not be a normal day as this virus quarantine continues. However, there will be little to distinguish it from other days, other than it is a glorious symbol of the patriotism of all Masons across the country. Even more important, we should view this as also a recognition for all the Lodge Brethren who have served in the armed services, including Brother George Sedlack and also for those who gave their lives in the pursuit of freedom. As it has for 243 years, the Stars and Stripes, a thing of rare beauty, will wave in the gentle breeze of spring as the symbol of these United States of America.





Freemasonry is at the very base of the United States, a country that has allowed the union of different races and which has mutual respect and goodwill at its heart. These are all principles found in Freemasonry.

Freemasonry at the Forefront of American History

Freemasonry's real impact on America is richer and more significant than anything that entertainment or speculation would hold. As a radical thought movement that emerged from the Reformation, Freemasonry was the first widespread and well-connected organization to espouse religious toleration and liberty—principles that the fraternity helped spread through the American colonies.

It may seem anomalous for such liberal principles to arise from a clandestine brotherhood; but skullduggery was never Masonry's primary aim. In an age of religious conflict in 17th century Europe—when an individual caught running afoul of church strictures could suffer persecution or worse—Freemasons clung to secrecy less out of esoteric drama than political expedience. Freemasons believed in a search for religious truth as it existed in all civilizations, including those of a pre-Christian past, and they drew upon ancient and occult symbols, from pentagrams to luminescent eyeballs, as codes for ethical development and civic progress. Reactions from church authorities ranged from suspicion to hostility. European Masons had good reason to be discrete.


Thirteen bricks went out on the first order and should be here in several weeks. I will install them as soon as they arrive and attach pictures as well!

The sale of bricks will bring in revenue for our Temple Board so that we can begin seriously tackling issues around improving the facilities of our Lodge building and property.

The bricks will be a legacy to Freemasonry in the Puyallup Valley and will be placed around the perimeter of our new flag pole. Bricks are \$100 each and will contain your name, when you were raised and what position you hold in the Lodge. Some folks are purchasing bricks for family members and in remembrance of those who are no longer with us. The bricks can also be purchased by our youth groups as well as associated organizations.

Hugh Crockett – The First Master of Corinthian Lodge

Hugh Crockett is a mystery man. Not much is known about the First Worshipful Master of Corinthian Lodge #38. And even though he doesn't appear in local history books, his legacy still stands in our city today. That's right, Crockett's Public House at 118 E. Stewart sits on land that WB Hugh donated to the city in the 1880's to build an Episcopal Church

Crockett was born in Virginia in 1829, he came out over the Oregon trail in 1851. He settled in Coupeville on Whidbey island and became the first Sheriff of Island County in 1853...

In 1875, he moved to Seattle and worked in a sawmill for two years before moving to Puyallup where he appears in the 1880 census as a hotel operator. In 1877 he bought and farmed six acres of land.

In January 1882, Crockett, along with six other people petitioned to start a Masonic Lodge in Puyallup. On July 6, 1882, Corinthian was constituted by Grandmaster J.A. Kuhn of the Grand Lodge of Washington State.


Crockett passed away on March 26,1900 at age 70 and is interred at Woodbine Cemetery.





Meet our Junior Warden

Greetings, Brethren! As the Junior Warden of Corinthian Lodge No. 38, I suspect that many of you don't know much about me, as I only started attending stated meetings a couple of years ago. I had not attended for about 8 years, due to a conflict on Thursday evenings, singing in our church choir. Back around 2010 or so, I did participate in some degrees with the Lodge, and actually conferred the Third Degree on one candidate.

I was born in San Diego in 1938, and have lived in the Seattle area since 1946. My wife, Darlene and I both attended Renton High School, and we both graduated in 1956. We did not see each other for 45 years, but we showed up at our 50th High School Reunion as a newlywed couple!

When we moved to Puyallup from Lynnwood in 2009, I joined Corinthian Lodge No. 38. I am very happy that I have been able to participate in the Lodge's activities the past three years.

I have been a Master Mason for 26 years. My home Lodge is Green Lake No. 149 in Seattle. I was first Worshipful Master there in 2000, and again in 2008. I also am a member of Walter F. Meier Lodge of Research No. 281, where I was WM in 2006.

Some of you know me from the York Rite or Scottish Rite, where I have been longtime member, as well as leading a number of bodies. I served as Grand Illustrious Master of the Grand Council Royal & Select Masters of Washington 2011-2012.

I made my living for over 36 years as a software engineer/database administrator for a number of companies. After retiring in 2002, I worked the next 18 years as an income tax preparer.

I served in the U.S. Army on active duty from 1957-1965, and in the US Army Reserve from 1973-1998, where I was mostly a personnel sergeant, and then as a Master Sergeant I led a staff for the Deputy Chief of Staff Information Management at Ft. Lawton, WA.

I graduated with a BA in Accounting from the University of Washington in 1976.

My hobbies have been bowling, golf, playing saxophone, and singing in our church choir.

The Junior Warden is the 3rd in line within the Masonic lodge hierarchy and helps the lodge to run smoothly, both at labor and at refreshment. In Freemasonry, the Junior Warden is an elected officer in the Lodge. His position is similar to a Vice-President.

He sits in the South (symbolic of the position of the sun at midday) and is responsible for the Brethren while the Lodge is at ease or refreshment.

It is his to arrange all meals for the lodge, and, typically, the 2 Stewards act as his assistants in this responsibility. Symbolically, it is also his duty to make certain that the members do not convert their refreshment into intemperance or excess.

His Jewel of Office is the Plumb,... which is a stonemason's instrument used for ascertaining the alignment of a vertical surface. It symbolizes upright behavior among Masons.


Freemasonry is an individual journey towards becoming a better father, husband, friend, citizen and man, supported by other men at different points on the same journey. For centuries, the Lodge itself has been the launchpad for Masonic Education, and a common ground for Brethren of different backgrounds to meet and exchange ideas, provide support and offer friendship.

The traditions of Freemasonry are founded upon the building of King Solomon's Temple, and its fraternal ceremonies use the working tools of the stonemasons to symbolize moral lessons of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

For example, Masons are reminded at Lodge to "meet upon the level of equality, act by the plumb of uprightness, and part upon the square of virtue."



For those brothers who are new to Corinthian Lodge, the work you do as an Entered Apprentice Mason serves as a foundation for many of the other things you will learn as you advance on your Masonic journey. Therefore it's important to study the basics now because it paves the way for understanding in times yet to come.



Freemasonry is not meant in any way to interfere with an individual's commitment to his faith, family or occupation. Freemasonry is not and never can be a replacement for these important institutions; rather, it is a positive environment that reminds every Mason of himself, his family, community and the Supreme Architect (an individual's own definition of a Supreme Being.)

The experience of becoming a member of a Masonic Lodge is divided into three ceremonial stages that Masons call "degrees." These three degrees are loosely based upon the journeyman system, which was used to educate Medieval Craftsmen. Symbolically, the degrees represent the three stages of human development: youth, manhood and age.

During all three ceremonies, a candidate is treated with complete respect. At no time is he ever made to feel uncomfortable or harassed in any way. Masonic ceremonies are a wonderful tradition shared by men such as George Washington, Harry S. Truman and other men of integrity. These ceremonies are always conferred in such a way as to bring pride to the candidate and the members of the Lodge.

Entered Apprentice	• This is a candidate's first experience with the ceremonies of the Fraternity, and like all Masonic ceremonies, it is a solemn and meaningful event. Once a candidate completes the Entered Apprentice ceremony, he takes his first step as a Freemason and enjoys the title of "Brother."
Fellowcraft	• The second ceremony exposes a Brother to more of the symbolism and philosophy of the Fraternity. For skilled Craftsmen, this degree would have marked a person's progress from an apprentice to a journeyman.
Master Mason	• The last of the Lodge ceremonies, the Master Mason degree, makes a candidate a full member of the Fraternity, enjoying both the rights and responsibilities of membership. The Master Mason has the right to visit lodges throughout the world. He will meet men who would otherwise

You're a Master Mason, Now What?

Remember when you finally became a high school senior? You finally made it, strutting around campus with your chest jetting out. You were cool because now you were the top dog. But sooner than later, most of us figured out there was more, much more and life beyond high school beckoned.

So too, is it with Masonry.

Getting to Master Mason was hard work. No doubt about it. Lots of studying, lots of memory work. Lots of stuff that you read in books and papers that you still don't quite get. I mean what is the real reason for a cable tow or the checkered floor outside the Lodge Room? And does anyone other than the ritual team remember what the Apron Lecture really meant?

Scottish Rite

- The Scottish Rite is one of the appendant bodies of Freemasonry that a Master Mason may join for further exposure to the principles of Freemasonry. It is also concordant, in that some of its degrees relate to the degrees of Symbolic Freemasonry.
- The Scottish Rite builds upon the ethical teachings and philosophy offered in the Craft (or Blue) Lodge, through dramatic presentation of the individual degrees.
- •Scottish Rite is the "graduate school" of Masonic education

Shriners

- The Shriners is a Masonic society established in 1870. It is a fraternity based on fun, fellowship, and the Masonic principles of brotherly love, relief, and truth. The organization is best known for the Shriners Hospitals for Children that it administers, and the red fezzes that members wear.
- The organization was previously known as "Shriners North America".
 The name was changed in 2010 across North America, Central America, South America. Europe. and Southeast Asia.

York Rite

- The York Rite is one of the appendant bodies of Freemasonry that a Master Mason may join to further his knowledge of Freemasonry. But the York Rite is not found as a single system worldwide, and outside of the United States there are often significant differences in ritual, as well as organization.
- The three primary bodies in the York Rite are the Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, Council of Royal & Select Masters or Council of Cryptic Masons, and the Commandery of Knights Templar, each of which are governed independently but are all considered to be a part of the York Rite. The Rite's name is derived from the city of York, where, according to one Masonic legend, the first meetings of Masons in England took place.



- Seek Help If overwhelmed or feeling unsafe





News from Grand Lodge


The big news for brethren is that the annual communication will be held, but limited. Per Grand Master Charles E. Wood all public events are canceled.

- All Lodge in the Grand Lodge of Washington remain closed during this stay-at-home quarantine.
- The Annual Communication shall commence at 10 AM on Saturday, June 13, 2020.
- The Communication shall be limited to one day.
- Each Lodge shall be represented by its Worshipful Master or his duly appointed proxy (who must be a member of the Lodge and must be a Master Mason in Good Standing).
- Each District will meet in a predetermined location(s) within the District.
- No Legislation, except that which is necessary and essential for continuity of operations of the Grand Lodge, shall be voted on at the Annual Communication. (At this time, the only Legislation that will be voted upon is Resolution 2020-15 concerning the re purposing of the Home Fund and Home Endowment Fund. All other resolutions will be tabled until the 2021 Annual Communication).
- There shall be an election to fill all elective Grand Lodge offices and Trustee positions.
- There shall be a vote to approve the proposed Grand Lodge 2020-2021 Budget and Appropriations for Washington Masonic Charities, as well as reports on the Grand Master's Message and Grand Secretary's Report.

The Annual Communication shall be conducted via Zoom video conferencing. However, no esoteric portions shall be broadcast.

The Installation of Grand Lodge Officers will be abbreviated. Appointed Officers, Deputies of the Grand Master and Committeemen will be installed by proclamation.

Brothers will be asked to adhere to social distancing recommendations made by public health organizations. This would include recommendations to wear facial covering, practice social distancing of 6 feet or more and frequent washing of hands.

If possible, host Lodges should make hand sanitizer available where access to soap and water is not possible. If you are ill, have been exposed to someone who may be ill, have underlying health or immunity issues or do not feel that you can safely attend, you should not attend.

The Square and Compasses is the single most identifiable symbol of Freemasonry. The square, to square our actions; The compasses, to circumscribe and keep us within bounds with all mankind. In many English speaking countries, the Square and Compasses are depicted with the letter "G" in the center. The letter has multiple meanings, representing different words depending on the context in which it is discussed. The most common is that the "G" stands for God. Another is that it stands for Geometry, and is to remind Masons that Geometry and Freemasonry are synonymous terms described as being the "noblest of sciences", and "the basis upon which the superstructure of Freemasonry and everything in existence in the entire universe is erected. In this context, it can also stand for Grand Architect of the Universe (a non-denominational reference to God).
